The trustees are pleased to present their annual report together with the financial statements of the Charity for the period 01 April 2018 to 30 September 2019 which are also prepared to meet the requirements of a Directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and, Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard's applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

## **Chair's Report**

Trying to find the words to sum up the last 18 months feels like a near impossible task. For the voluntary sector in Newcastle and Gateshead, we know from our 'Canaries in the Coal Mine' report that 80% of organisations have seen a demand for their services growing yet again, that poverty, exacerbated by welfare reform, continues to be a blight on our society, and that funding for the sector is harder and harder to come by. Mental wellbeing is a topic that has lost its taboo status for many and is revealed to be little short of a regional and national crisis. Local authorities are doing their best in the face of deep and sustained budget cuts and the much-heralded 'end of austerity' has yet to arrive. The North East has the highest unemployment rate and the lowest job creation rate in Great Britain. And in 2020, we now are at a moment where life expectancy amongst women in the poorest areas is actually declining. Life for many is truly hard.

And yet there is optimism. Volunteering is growing and innovation is happening, with many voluntary organisations developing new and better services. Necessity is quite literally in this case the mother of invention. On the environment, 2019 was the year that Extinction Rebellion rose to prominence as a movement in response to the present and continuing critical damage to the planet, our country and the neighbourhoods in which we live. The declaration of Climate Emergency is a necessary first step and the actions that follow are the essential next steps. Seeing so many people demanding change and being the change gives optimism that we have the possibility for a better future.

Looking at our own organisation, in the last year we have changed our name from 'Newcastle Council for Voluntary Service' to 'Connected Voice'. Connected Voice means that we connect the sector, both within itself and externally, and we amplify the voice the sector to decision makers and multiply the influence of individual members as a result. We also said a fond farewell to Sally Young, who served as our Chief Executive for many years with distinction. We made sure that this extraordinary service was acknowledged at the end of 2019 and I am glad to do so again today. We have been delighted to welcome Lisa Goodwin as our Chief Executive from October 1st 2019. Lisa's track record in the sector, with VODA and then VONNE has been excellent and we are excited by the leadership she will bring to the next phase of our journey.

'Journey' describes a long endeavour and ours reached 90 years in 2019. 90 years of helping, supporting and enabling the people to do their very best to help those who need it most. 90 years of seeking to reduce inequality, always remembering that humanity and compassion are definitive aspects of who we are. I am

grateful to everyone who came before us in those 90 years that they enabled this organisation to have a sustainable future and I know that all of us commit to that same responsibility for those who come after us. They have all done their vital work in difficult circumstances as they faced the outside world. I am pleased that as an organisation, Connected Voice achieved the Investors in People Award and the Gold level of Better Health at Work, which mark the standard we strive for in nurturing a good place to work. I would also like to thank my fellow Trustees who have given of their time so selflessly. Last but by no means least, thank you to you, the individuals and organisations that make up the voluntary sector in Newcastle and Gateshead. So often you put yourself second to put others first and, when there is so much that could make us all feel downhearted, that is truly inspiring.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 having due regard to the general guidance of the Charity Commission with respect to public benefit when reviewing the Connected Voice aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular, the trustees considered how the planned activities would contribute to the aims and objectives they have set. There has been a review of the support given to voluntary and community organisations to improve effectiveness and efficiency, including the introduction of some new services across Newcastle and Gateshead. Our advocacy services extend across the wider North East area.

## **Today and for the Future**

Our overall strategic aim is to improve quality of life through a broad programme of voluntary action recognising that priority should be focussed on the most disadvantaged communities. During 2018-19 we contributed to this aim in the following ways:

- As a high performing and leading organisation providing a voice for individuals and the voluntary and community sector.
- By providing a range of advocacy services and support to vulnerable people
- By championing voluntary and community action
- By strengthening voluntary and community organisations through our advice services
- By highlighting issues around poverty and inequality in Newcastle and Gateshead in our research, and addressing these through our work.

## **Our Volunteers**

Connected Voice values the unique contribution of our volunteers and the added value they bring. It is the intention of Connected Voice that all volunteers will be supported, respected and valued. We encourage volunteers to fulfil their potential and aim to provide meaningful roles where both the organisation and the volunteer mutually benefit. Connected Voice has policies and procedures in place and works closely with our partner, Volunteer Centre Newcastle, in order to ensure that best practice is applied with respect to volunteering.

#### **Our staff**

We recognise the value and expertise of our staff. We are aware that the external funding environment is challenging; however we put in place appropriate support as a good employer. We have a range of staff engagement and involvement activities. We hold the Better Health at Work award at the silver level and worked towards Gold during the year. We are an accredited Living Wage Employer. We are actively involved in the Time to Change Campaign about improving mental health, and this year we introduced menopause awareness sessions for our staff. We have an apprentice and regularly involve interns.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

Connected Voice promotes voluntary and community action, providing voluntary sector organisations with services that enable them to be well run, fulfil their aims and objectives and provide them with the opportunity to extend their influence in the city through the sector's collective voice.

Connected Voice does this specifically by providing expert advice on governance, on the policies and procedures that voluntary organisations need to have to ensure they are safe and securely run, and by providing funding advice based on experience and knowledge of what funders are seeking in a good application.

We hold regular forums and network events to keep the sector informed about new initiatives, new policies and legislation, and provide opportunities for voluntary organisations to increase their reach and influence. The forums are a place where Connected Voice members come together, where they can engage directly with public sector agencies and where voluntary sector representatives on multi-sector partnerships can inform and be accountable to their peers.

We also engage in appropriate area-wide, sub-regional, regional and national activities as we want to be able to promote, share and deliver best practice. We work with a wide range of public sector partners – local authorities, NHS trusts, Clinical Commissioning groups, the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner, Newcastle and Northumbria Universities and others. Through our work with SkillsBridge we engage in new partnerships with local businesses.

We continued to run the Haref project as part of our core service after taking on the work in 2017. This enabled us to extend our reach within BAME community groups, and to ensure they have access to support to address health inequalities.

Connected Voice Advocacy continues to provide a range of statutory and community advocacy projects across the North East. The Hate Crime advocacy work gathered pace and we contributed to the development of LGBT advocacy services. The DIY Advocate app has helped generate important additional income for us and we have trained health professionals on using it.

## **Support and Development**

Our Support and Development team worked with **465** organisations in Newcastle and Gateshead, providing advice and guidance on areas such as governance, legal structures, income generation, policies and procedures, and organisational development. As part of this service, the team helped organisations submit grant funding applications with a combined worth of approximately **£2.5 million**.

We organised **23** focused networking events. Our Children and Young People's Forums had themes such as strategic and partnership working, food poverty, and holiday hunger. Our Wellbeing and Health Open Forums had themes such as food and the voluntary sector, and health and wellbeing of minority communities. We organised a very well attended Movember event to talk about men's mental health and we arranged budget consultation sessions for Newcastle City Council and Gateshead Council.

The team delivered **21** skills-building sessions on topics such as Good Governance, Good Fundraising, Cyber Security, General Data Protection Regulations, Insurance and HR and Employment Law. The Team also organised **3** Funding Fairs, 2 in Newcastle in 2018 and 2019, and 1 in Gateshead in 2018, all of which were well attended by VCSE organisations and local and national grant funders.

We produced research reports on Food Poverty in Newcastle and Canaries in the Coal Mine: The Views of the Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise Sector. Both reports received local, regional and national recognition.

We managed and developed the OurGateshead website, a resource for people to find out about activities and services in Gateshead, which received **186,523** visits and **428,961** page views.

We won two NAVCA Awards in 2019, one for Leadership and one for Embracing Digital.

## **Premium Services**

We continued to generate additional income through our specialist services and during the year an increased number of organisations used our services to undertake organisational reviews, and to improve their governance.

## Representation

Our representational role was significantly reduced during this period due to the changes in funding arrangements. We continue to ensure representation of the sector throughout Newcastle and Gateshead but we no longer have capacity to do this at the previous level. We ensured the sector had a voice and was represented at key meetings including health and wellbeing boards, Adults and Children's Safeguarding boards, and various strategic multi agency partnerships across Newcastle and Gateshead.

## Information

We are a key source of information for the voluntary and community sector in Newcastle and Gateshead. In the reporting period we:

- Delivered 1500 copies of our quarterly magazine to our members and key contacts
- Streamlined and reviewed our information sheets
- Developed our Twitter following from 2,905 followers in April 2018 to 3661 followers by Sept 2019
- Increased our followers on Facebook to 828 and LinkedIn to 308
- Increased our income from jobs listings on our website
- Undertook a significant re-branding exercise which resulted in a new name, logo, brand and values.

## **Financial support**

Our trading subsidiary Ellison Services Ltd T/A Charity Business Services continued to provide payroll, accounting and book-keeping services, supporting over 200 VCSE organisations.

#### Haref

Haref works with Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic (BAME) communities to identify their key issues around health and improve the health information available to them. We help health services gain a better understanding of what communities need and we build confidence within communities so they can talk to health services about their cultural needs. During this year, Haref took on the management of our BAME public health contract as part of our streamlining of staffing.

## Key achievements were:

- Cultural competency training delivered to 298 attendees
- April 2018- 3500 Ramadan calendars distributed to 10 mosques with 3000 directly into people's homes across Newcastle, North Tyneside and Gateshead. In April 19 this increased with 4300 calendars distributed to 11 mosques and 3500 homes.
- Engaged with 60 BAME organisations
- Facilitated 4 Community forums on behalf of the CCG in 2018, and a further two up until Sept 2019
- Delivered 4 focus groups about Urgent Care Centres with the Haref network for the CCG
- Delivered 2 focus groups to the Haref Network with the Environment Agency to build community resilience
- Completed 30 Surveys with the Haref Network on smoking behaviours and attitudes for NCC Public Health
- Delivered 3 Haref Network meetings on the themes of mental health for BAME communities, hate crime, and future work streams
- Co-delivered a Time Out session with Doctors of the World on Safe Surgeries resulting in 11 GPs signing up as Safe Surgery
- Co-produced the Health Access Cards with NCC Public Health with 5000 cards distributed in Newcastle
- Hosted 2 training sessions on 'Ensuring equal access to the NHS' delivered by JCWI
- Established the Haref Allies network and held our first meeting with them
- Delivered 'Improving access to health services for BAME communities' training to Richmond Fellowship in Middlesbrough
- Hosted 2 training sessions on 'NHS charging regulations' delivered by Maternity action

- Hosted 3 sessions by 'English Unlocked' on 'Communications skills' with someone whose first language is not English
- Supported Riverside CHP and The Children's society on publicity and communications and Networking for EU Settlement scheme
- Regularly contacted 557 individuals via our Haref bulletin

## **Advocacy**

2018/19 has been another successful year for Connected Voice Advocacy. Our advocates stood shoulder to shoulder with more people than ever before to provide them with support to have their views heard and needs met. Advocates worked together with service users to achieve significantly improved independence, choice and control, engagement with services, access to services and health and wellbeing.

Our range of services promote social inclusion, equality and social justice and have enabled us to meet the diverse and complex needs of people in vulnerable circumstances across the region, mainly in Newcastle and Gateshead, but also to people living across Tyneside and Northumberland.

## In 2018/19 we:

- Provided over 30,000 hours of direct advocacy support to over 2000 people
- Worked on over 3000 issues with our service users
- Trained, supported and mentored 21 volunteer Advocates
- Worked with people from 76 BAME communities
- Employed four bilingual Advocates
- Employed a level 3 Business Administration Apprentice

## Community advocacy services in Newcastle and Gateshead

- BAME supported adults from Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities with health and social care issues
- **Health and Care** supported adults with physical disabilities, learning disabilities and mental health needs with social care issues
- Families Through Crisis provided support to families in crisis
- Welfare supported adults in crisis around poverty and benefits helping them develop skills to navigate the system
- Neurological specialist support for adults with neurological conditions

## Statutory advocacy services in Gateshead

During 2018/19 our team of qualified advocates delivered **6746 hours of advocacy support to 652 clients** across the four roles under the three Acts which affect vulnerable people (mental health/capacity and care acts).

- Independent Mental Health Act supported people subject to the Mental Health Act around their care and treatment, ensuring their rights were upheld
- Independent Mental Capacity helped people who lack capacity, and do not have friends or relatives to support them, to make certain important decisions
- Independent Care Act supported people's involvement in care and support assessment, planning and review and safeguarding processes
- Relevant Person's Representatives ensured that the rights of people being deprived of their liberty under the Mental Capacity Act Deprivation of Liberty Safeguards were protected

We also provide all types of advocacy on an individually funded basis including out of area statutory cases, personal injury claimants, assistance in court and specialist advocacy for people with autism.

## Quality and Innovation

## **Acknowledgements**

Connected Voice records its appreciation to all our funders and supporters.

Connected Voice is an active member of NCVO, NAVCA, ACEVO, the Community Foundation (Tyne, Wear and Northumberland), the Advocacy Action Alliance, and OPAAL (Older People's Advocacy Alliance) We work closely with our sister infrastructure organisations across the North East and we are members of and contribute to a number of significant and appropriate local partnerships, initiatives, boards and committees.

## **Social Value**

Connected Voice tries to act in a socially responsible manner. We use other voluntary sector facilities and services wherever possible. We use sustainable products as far as possible. We try to use local suppliers. We use fair trade products. We take climate change seriously and we aim to reduce our environmental impact through the development of a climate change action plan, and regular staff meetings on this theme. The ratio of pay of the lowest earner to the pay of the top earner will never exceed 1:5. We are a Living Wage employer, accredited by the Living Wage Foundation, including apprentices and interns. All of our volunteers are supported in line with current volunteering policies. During the year we have benefitted from ten active trustees who all volunteered their skills, knowledge and expertise and linked us to helpful networks and useful partners.

#### **CONNECTED VOICE - PLANS FOR 2019-20**

## Our plans include:

## **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

Connected Voice bids for funds via statutory sources and charitable trusts and foundations, and does minimal public fundraising. A substantial part of our income comes through contracts, supplemented by grants. Connected Voice is assiduous in looking for appropriate sources of funding, and as an organisation responsible for advising the voluntary sector on funding sources is well placed to know what is available. We use a full cost recovery model which enables us to estimate the actual costs of a service and its true cost to Connected Voice. As the value of public sector contracts continues to decrease, this is an essential tool for us to use in deciding whether or not to bid for a service.

Senior managers and the Treasurer meet to set budgets annually and during the course of the reporting period the management team worked on improved, more dynamic financial reporting, which is due to be implemented in the coming year

We hold four key contracts (with Newcastle Council, Gateshead Council, and Newcastle Gateshead CCG) and anticipate that all of these will go out to tender in the 19-20 financial year. This will present a challenge for us in terms of capacity, however we keep up to speed on contract publication dates and will plan our workload accordingly.

Our trustees are clear about our aims and mission and that we need to be sustainable, but keep to our vision and values. Connected Voice will not enter into partnerships and contracts which are contrary to our aims and objectives and we recognise that we need to stay within our agreed budget limits for the year.

## **Assets**

The charity's assets are being held to enable them to carry out its objectives. The movements in fixed assets during the year are set out in note 22 to the accounts.

## **Trading activities**

The results of Connected Voice Charity Business Services, our trading company, are summarised in note 24 of the accounts. A surplus was generated during the period of £13,584 (2018: £21,491)

## **Financial dependency**

The charity in order to meet its objectives is financially dependent on grants from the Local Authorities, government programmes and charitable trusts.

Additional funds are derived from smaller grants and charitable donations made by a variety of organisations and individuals.

## Funds held as custodian trustee on behalf of others

Connected Voice and its subsidiary hold monies on behalf of other organisations. Connected Voice Charity Business Services provides payroll and bookkeeping services to a number of small voluntary organisations and holds monies for this purpose. Further detail is given in note 32.

## **Reserves Policy**

The Reserves Policy considers the financial circumstances of the organisation. We have spent, as expected, significant reserves in the last year paying off the pension deficit, restructuring the organisation and rebranding ourselves to be a new organisation not just for Newcastle. The risks we noted in the previous Trustees Report are therefore significantly lower.

We therefore feel that is appropriate to reduce the figure for reserves required to three to five months running costs. Three months running costs would equate to around £332,000 and five months £553,000, based on the accounts for the 18 months to 30 September 2019. The reserves should not fall below this level in order to support good governance of the organisation.

The Reserve Policy allows for the use of funds in excess of the level required to be spent in furtherance of the organisation's vision and mission. Any proposal should be presented as an individual business case to the Trustees for review and approval.

As at 30 September 2019 free reserves (unrestricted funds not invested in tangible fixed assets) are £725,255, (2018: £802,941) a decrease of £83,016 which is primarily due to paying off the pension deficit. The Trustees monitor the level of reserves regularly and the Reserves Policy is reviewed annually with the support of the Finance Sub Group. The trustees have agreed to designate £150,000 of reserves towards business development work and the costs associated with a senior management restructure.

## Review of transactions and financial position

The consolidated balance sheet on page 30 indicates that at 30 September 2019 the total funds of the group are £813,403 (2018: £953,983). This was represented by tangible fixed assets of £2,316 (2018: £5,330), investments of £397,985 (2018: £480,756) and net current assets of £413,102 (2018: £613,897). Unrestricted funds of £725,255 (2018: £808,271) represent the reserves available to the organisation to fulfil its many existing commitments over the long term. Restricted funds of £88,148 (2018: £145,712) represent specific earmarked projects as detailed in note 34 of the accounts.

#### Investment income

Connected Voice is also usually in the position of having to fund a considerable proportion of its core running costs each year and the income it derives from its invested reserves is an essential component of that strategy, alongside donations, earnings and other provisions.

Tilney are the appointed wealth investment organisation managing the Connected Voice investment portfolio. The Finance Sub-Group monitors the performance of the portfolio, reviewing the quarterly financial investment reports provided by Tilney and reporting into the board meetings. Trustees support the investment objective for Connected Voice which is to yield the best financial return within the level of risk considered to be acceptable. This return can then be spent on the charity's aims and further continuance of its objectives. The Trustees are comfortable that the investments held are a diversified portfolio in order to mitigate the capital risk. The Finance Sub-Group has put forward an Investment Strategy Policy. The investment balances as at the 30 September 2019 are £397,985 (2018: 480,756). No additional funds were added to the investment portfolio in the year, all dividends and income are reinvested. The investment portfolio was reduced by £150,000 during the period to contribute to paying off the pension deficit.

## **Pension deficit**

The trustees paid off a significant liability during the reporting period in terms of the pension deficit. This has put the organisation in a more stable financial position but obviously had an impact on level of reserves.

## **Political contributions**

The charity made no political contributions.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity's full name is Connected Voice. It is an incorporated charity registered with the Charity Commission (number 1125877) and a company limited by guarantee (number 06681475).

## **Governing documents**

The charity's governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Connected Voice is an independent charity working with the voluntary sector in Newcastle. It is run by a Board of Trustees elected annually by its member organisations, and by co-opted members. The Board controls the direction and policy of the work, and met ten times during this financial year. It holds a special business planning meeting with senior managers, at least once a year, in order to define the priorities for the coming year.

Connected Voice is a membership organisation with 759 members and 81 associate members as of September 2019.

## **Recruitment of trustees**

Trustees are elected from the membership annually. Notice is sent to all members and if a ballot is required it is conducted by post prior to the Annual General Meeting. Trustees may only serve for a set period of time. The skills and experience of existing trustees are audited annually and new trustees are recruited in order to complement the existing trustees ensuring a wide set of skills and knowledge is reflected in the overall board. If the Board feels there are particular skills lacking, they are able to promote these during the recruitment process. The governance document allows for co-opted trustees so that specialist skills can be brought onto the board. The Chair has experience of business and Human Resources and is not from the voluntary sector, although he chairs another voluntary organisation. The treasurer is a qualified accountant who works in the public sector.



#### TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT

All trustees have a comprehensive induction session with the Chief Executive. They also complete a form to assess any relevant training they may need and these needs are met as far as is practical. Trustees are offered opportunities to find out more about Connected Voice and the voluntary and community sector in Newcastle and Gateshead, as well as national issues affecting voluntary organisations. Trustees receive a full induction pack including examples of best practice and guidance produced by the Charity Commission. Trustees are encouraged to be fully involved in the work of Connected Voice. Annually, the Chair carries out a confidential interview with each trustee to identify any challenges, concerns and priorities. These are collated into a single document and discussed openly at Board.

## **Organisational structure**

The Board of trustees, which can have up to 16 members, has control of the charity, including its property and its funds. The Board normally meets bi-monthly and there are three sub groups covering finance, business development, and advocacy report into the Board. The Chief Executive is appointed by the trustees to manage the charity and has delegated authority for all operational matters.

## Pay policy for senior staff

The Chief Executive implements the pay policy on an ongoing basis and is responsible for pay reviews and setting salaries for senior staff. The Board reviews the Chief Executive's salary annually and is responsible for making any decisions about remuneration of the Chief Executive. Remuneration is benchmarked against similar roles within voluntary and community sector organisations of similar size in the North East. The need for major changes to the salary structure may be informed by a number of factors such as changes to the organisation's annual turnover and the number of employees.

Connected Voice has a Remuneration Policy which covers all staff. Senior staff are not treated differently to other staff and all benefits (including pension contributions) are applied equally across all staff groups.

## Related parties and co-operation with other organisations

None of the trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the charity. Any connection between trustees or senior managers of the charity with suppliers must be disclosed to the full Board of trustees. In the current year no such related party transactions were reported. Trustees are asked to declare their interests before each board meeting and there is a Register of Interests.

The charity's wholly owned subsidiary, Ellison Services Ltd, T/A Charity Business Services was established to operate as a commercial accountancy service and gift aids all of its profits to the charity (see note 25 to the accounts).

## Risk management

The trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks. The Board review these risks on a regular basis and a full report is discussed at a Board meeting annually where mitigating actions identified and taken. Health and Safety information is presented on a quarterly basis to the Board.

## Indemnity insurance

The charity has Professional Indemnity Insurance cover in respect of the Trustees and Officers of the charity.

## TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENTS

The charity trustees are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company, the group and of the incoming resources and application of resources including the income and expenditure of the charitable group for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2016 (FRS 102);
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the group, and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## 1 Accounting Policies

The principle accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

## 2 Basis of accounting

## 2.1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – Charities SORP (FRS 102), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

Connected Voice meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

## 2.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the Trustees believe that no material uncertanties exist. The charity reported total unrestricted funds at the year end of £150,000 and has already secured a significant amount of funding for the current year. The trustees are of the view that the immediate future of the charity for the next 12 to 18 months is secure and that on this basis the charity is a going concern.

## 2.3 Group financial statements

These financial statements consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly-owned subsidiary Charity Business Services on a line by line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities for the charity itself is not presented because the charity has taken advantage of the exemptions afforded by section 408 of the Companies Act 2006.

## 3 Income

## 3.1 Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the resources, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is more likely than not that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

#### 3.2 Offsetting

There has been no offsetting of assets and liabilities or income and expenses, unless required or permitted by FRS102 SORP or FRS102.

## 3.3 Trading activities

Income from trading activities is to raise funds for the charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.

#### 3.4 Grants and donations

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance or provision of other specified services is deferred until the criteria of income recognition are met.

## 3.5 Volunteer help

The value of volunteer help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

## 3.6 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

## 3.7 Investment income

Investment Income is earned through holding assets for investment purposes such as shares and cash deposits. it includes dividends and interest: and amounts are recognised when the charity's right to receive payment is established

## 3.8 Investment gains and losses

This includes any realised or unrealised gains or losses on the sale of investment and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

## 3.9 Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charities' work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

## 4 Expenditure and liabilities

## 4.1 Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised when it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

## 4.2 Charitable activities

Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of voluntary sector support, advocacy and other activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs.

## 4.3 Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly relate to the charitable activities. Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

## 4.4 Holding accounts

The charity and its subsidiary hold monies on behalf of other organisations as part of their payroll service. The balances held by the charity are not included within the balance sheet in accordance with SORP 2015; the balances of the subsidiary are recognised as an asset with the corresponding liability.

## 4.5 Operating lease

Rentals payable and receivable under operating leases are charged to the SoFA on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

## 4.6 Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

## 4.7 Creditors

The charity has creditors which are measured at their settlement amount less any trade discounts due.

## 4.8 Provisions for liabilities

A liability is measured on recognition at its historical cost and then subsequently measured at the best estimate of the amount required to settle the obligation at the reporting date.

## 5 Assets

## 5.1 Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

Electronic office equipment 25% straight line basis
Office equipment 10% straight line basis

#### 5.2 Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are valued initially at cost and subsequently at fair value (their market value) at the year end. The same treatment is applied to unlisted investments unless fair value cannot be measured reliably in which case it is measured at cost less impairment.

## 5.3 **Debtors**

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discount due.

## 6 Legal status

#### 32 Pension scheme

#### **Defined contribution scheme**

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company. The amount recognised as an expense in the period was £57,965 (2018 £40,555).

#### Defined benefit scheme

The charity left its defined benefit pension scheme on the 19 December 2018. A final settlement payment of £222,680 was paid to TPT Retirement Solutions.

The following note is purely for information relating to prior years, and that there is no possible liability under current legislation going forward.

The charity participated in the scheme, a multi-employer scheme which provides benefits to some 1,300 non-associated participating employers. The scheme is a defined benefit scheme in the UK. It is not possible for the charity to obtain sufficient information to enable it to account for the scheme as a defined benefit scheme. Therefore it accounts for the scheme as a defined contribution scheme.

The scheme is subject to the funding legislation outlined in the Pensions Act 2004 which came into force on 30 December 2005. This, together with documents issued by the Pensions Regulator and Technical Actuarial Standards by the Financial Reporting Council, set out in the framework for funding defined benefit occupational pension schemes in the UK.

The scheme is classified as a 'last-man standing arrangement'. Therefore the charity is potentially liable for other participating employers' obligations if those employers are unable to meet their share of the scheme deficit following withdrawal from the scheme. Participating employers are legally required to meet their share of the scheme deficit on an annuity purchase basis on withdrawal from the scheme.

A full actuarial valuation for the scheme was carried out at 30 September 2011. This valuation showed assets of, liabilities of and a deficit of.

A full actuarial valuation for the scheme was carried out at 30 September 2014. This valuation showed assets of 13584, liabilities of and a deficit of salary recharge. To eliminate this funding shortfall, the Trustee has asked the participating employers to pay additional contributions to the scheme as follows:

Where the scheme is in deficit and where the company has agreed to a deficit funding arrangement the company recognises a liability for this obligation. The amount recognised is the net present value of the deficit reduction contributions payable under the agreement that relates to the deficit. The present value is calculated using the discount rate detailed in these disclosures. The unwinding of the discount rate is recognised as a finance cost.
